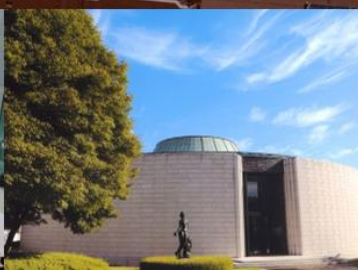

UNIQUE VENUES























































































A unique venue refers to a special event space that utilizes historical buildings, cultural facilities, or public spaces to create a distinctive atmosphere and highlight the local character. Unlike conventional conference halls, unique venues offer a different ambiance, allowing MICE participants to share extraordinary experiences and moments. This setting fosters active interaction and discussions among attendees. Within the Hiroshima Metropolitan Area, which covers approximately a 60 km radius around Hiroshima City, there are 21 unique venues, including museums, gardens, temples, and shopping streets. Each of these locations reflects the unique charm of its respective area. When planning MICE events in this region, we encourage you to take advantage of these unique venues to ensure the success of your event.

This guide introduces unique venues not only as locations for hosting receptions at international conferences but also as spaces for product exhibitions, team-building activities, small dining gatherings, and cultural experiences such as tea ceremonies and Zen meditation.

01 Hiroshima Museum of Art




An elegant venue surrounded by greenery

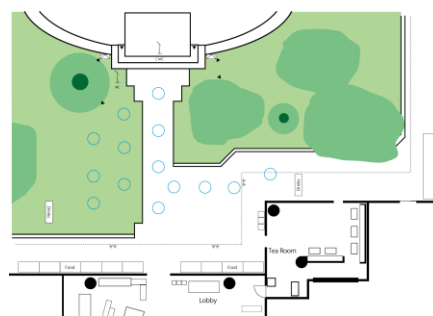
In the front garden of the Hiroshima Museum of Art, located within walking distance of the Hiroshima International Conference Center, stands a horse chestnut tree beside the Marronnier Fountain. This tree was a gift from Claude Picasso, son of Pablo Picasso, in 1980 when the museum first opened. Every year in early May, it blooms with charming pink flowers. Named after this tree, the Marronnier Fountain features Hiroshima's symbolic koi fish (Carp!) swimming gracefully. The refreshing spray of the fountain, combined with the vibrant presence of the koi, adds a lively touch to the museum's front garden.





Between party events, guests can enjoy a private viewing of the museum's collection, which includes Impressionist masterpieces by Monet and Renoir, modern French art by Van Gogh and Picasso, as well as works of modern Japanese art by Kuroda Seiki and Kishida Ryūsei. This exclusive experience serves as an excellent opportunity for icebreaking and networking. Additionally, the museum's main hall provides an elegant setting for live performances and ceremonies, creating a memorable opening for any gathering.

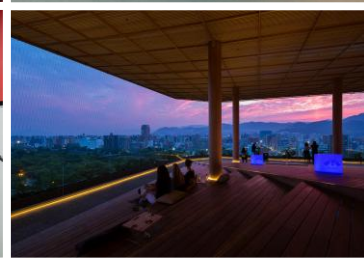
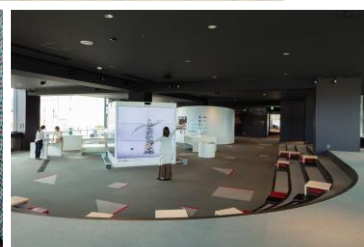


02 HIROSHIMA ORIZURU TOWER

The one and only space where you can feel Hiroshima

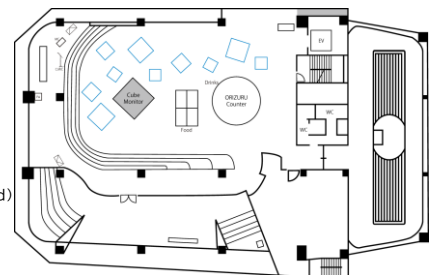
Located in the heart of Hiroshima, right next to the Atomic Bomb Dome, Orizuru Tower offers unique event spaces that provide a true sense of Hiroshima. Guests can hold parties at the open-air “Hiroshima-no-Oka” rooftop observation deck, which offers panoramic views of the city, or at the 12th-floor “Orizuru Plaza”, featuring immersive video displays and interactive content. A new addition to the 5th floor is the “2045 Future Presentation Room ‘Rin’”, a versatile space designed for conferences and dining, where guests can enjoy the natural beauty of Hiroshima’s cityscape. Conveniently within walking distance of the Hiroshima International Conference Center, Orizuru Tower also features a variety of meeting rooms, making it an ideal venue for conferences, and corporate training sessions.





The Hiroshima-no-Oka rooftop observation deck is an open-air space offering stunning panoramic views of Hiroshima City. It provides the perfect setting to welcome guests with a drink, creating an elegant and memorable start to any event. On the 12th floor, Orizuru Plaza can accommodate up to 150 guests for a standing reception, allowing for a sophisticated gathering with the cityscape of Hiroshima as a backdrop. The venue is equipped with a digital signage system (large monitor), enabling the display of logos, videos, and other visuals to create a fully customized event experience. The 5th-floor 2045 Future Presentation Room "Rin" is a versatile space that can host up to 150 guests in a theater-style arrangement. It features a state-of-the-art curved LED vision screen, which boasts one of the highest resolutions and largest sizes among rental conference rooms in Japan. The room can be divided into smaller sections to accommodate different needs, whether for conferences, banquets, or special gatherings. Guests can also enjoy the breathtaking seasonal scenery of Hiroshima, making for a truly exceptional experience.

03 Shukkeien Garden




A scenic spot with 400 years of history and changing seasons

Shukkeien is a historic daimyo garden that was originally built in 1620 (Genna 6) as the garden of a secondary residence for Asano Nagaakira, the lord of the Hiroshima domain. It was designed by Ueda Sōko, a renowned tea master and chief retainer of the Asano clan. Over the years, successive feudal lords made modifications, shaping the garden into the form we see today. Despite being located in the heart of a modern city, Shukkeien offers a tranquil retreat where visitors can enjoy the changing beauty of nature throughout the seasons. The garden's lush landscape provides a peaceful escape from the bustle of urban life. In spring, cherry blossoms and peach flowers bloom in abundance, while in summer, the fresh greenery of trees creates a vibrant scene. Autumn brings a stunning display of colorful foliage, and in winter, visitors can admire plum blossoms and camellias. As the seasons shift, the garden transforms, offering a serene and picturesque setting for a leisurely stroll.





Upon entering the garden, visitors are greeted by Seifukan, a sukiya-style tea house built in the shoin-zukuri architectural style. As the most iconic structure in Shukkeien, Seifukan serves not only as a venue for tea ceremonies but also as a space for experiencing traditional Japanese culture, including incense appreciation, classical dance, and traditional music performances. Surrounded by seasonal flowers and trees, the garden's central lawn area offers a picturesque setting for outdoor receptions. The experience becomes even more immersive when enjoyed while wearing traditional kimono, enhancing the elegance of the surroundings. Conveniently located in the heart of Hiroshima, Shukkeien is easily accessible from Hiroshima Station and the International Conference Center. Visitors can reach the garden by bus or streetcar, and, in keeping with Hiroshima's identity as the "City of Water," they can also arrive by water taxi, making Shukkeien a truly unique and accessible venue.

A stadium in the city where people gather, rejoice, and relax

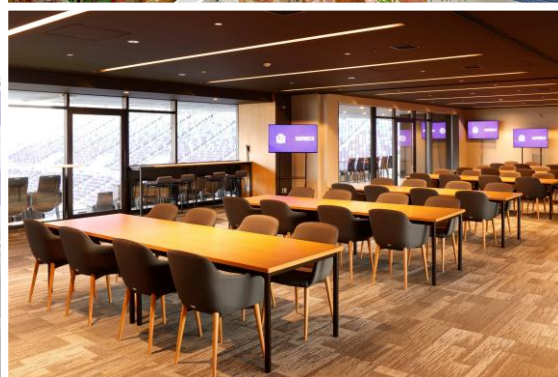

The adjacent waterfront plaza and lawn plaza can be used for a variety of events. Experience the luxury and exclusivity of using the lounge and special rooms of the stadium, a new landmark in Hiroshima.



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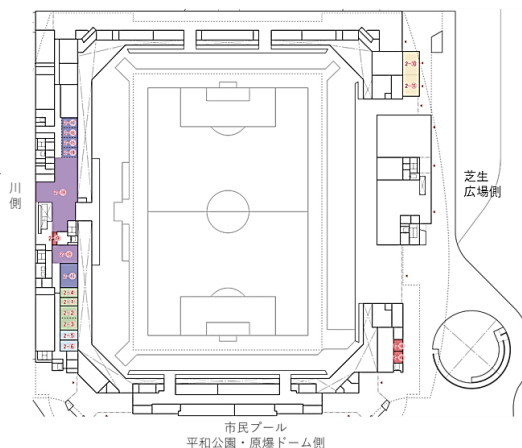

05 Hiroshima Gate Park

A bustling civic park where the future begins and possibilities expand

The former site of Hiroshima Municipal Baseball Stadium, located northeast of the Atomic Bomb Dome, was transformed into “Hiroshima Gate Park”, a public park, in the spring of 2023. The approximately 6,500 m² Gate Park Plaza (Central Event Plaza) allows for large-scale receptions and various productions. The approximately 900 m² Grand-Roofed Plaza inspired by the motif of folded paper cranes, provides a space for events even on rainy days. Within the park, visitors can enjoy a 190-meter-long row of cherry blossom trees with a clear view of the Atomic Bomb Dome, as well as the Hanover Garden, which commemorates the goodwill and friendship between Hiroshima and Hanover, Germany. Despite being in the heart of Hiroshima, the park offers a relaxing place where people can enjoy nature in a peaceful environment.





The Gate Park Plaza (Central Event Plaza), can accommodate large tents, allowing for a variety of uses without being affected by the weather. For receptions, catering services and kitchen cars can provide a wide range of dining options. In addition, a large stage can also be set up for traditional performing arts such as Kagura (Shinto music and dance) and taiko drumming performances, etc., while taking the surrounding environment into consideration. Open events can also be held to engage and interact with the public. The “Peace Promenade”, a peaceful walkway that follows the axis connecting the Peace Memorial Park and the Atomic Bomb Dome, encourages visitors to explore this unique area.

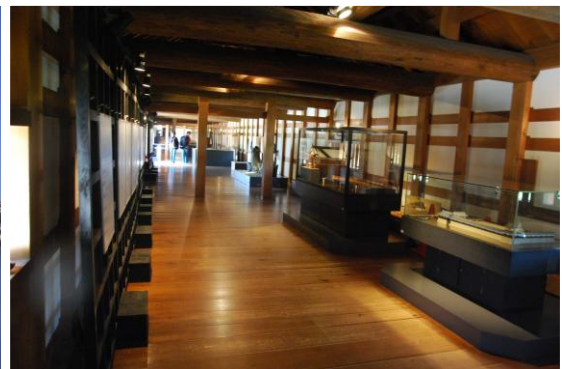


06 Hiroshima Castle

Rich in local history, beautiful in every season

Hiroshima Castle was built by Mōri Terumoto at the mouth of the Ōta River and is also known as Rijō (Carp Castle). The castle tower, located in Honmaru, was destroyed by the atomic bombing in 1945 and was later rebuilt in 1958 as a faithful reproduction of its original exterior.

The current tower, which has long served as a history museum popular among visitors, was closed on March 22, 2026, due to aging and other factors. However, visitors can still explore reconstructed wooden turrets and gates in Ninomaru. The castle grounds remain a place where visitors can immerse themselves in the castle's history while admiring the faithfully reconstructed exterior of the castle tower.

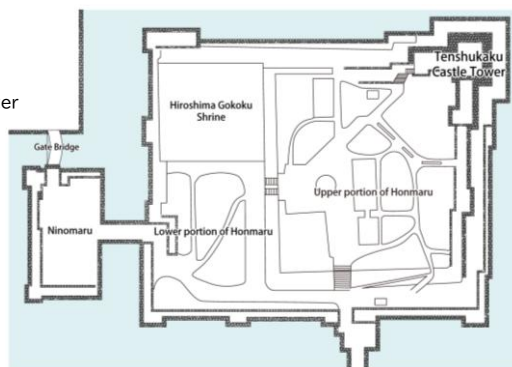




Hiroshima Castle offers visitors a glimpse of the changing seasons in their full splendor. In spring, numerous cherry blossoms—primarily Somei-Yoshino cherry trees—can be admired both within castle grounds and along the outer moat. In autumn, the park is bathed in warm crimson tones from the changing foliage, while in winter, the castle takes on a majestic appearance when blanketed in snow.

On the south side of Sannomaru, a new complex featuring dining and retail facilities opened in 2025, adding to the area’s vibrancy. On the north side, development is underway for a history museum in Sannomaru, which will focus on the history and culture of early modern Hiroshima, as well as a multipurpose plaza designed to host kagura performances and more.

07 Takanobashi Shopping Arcade

A retro shopping arcade and center for community through the ages

The history of Takanobashi Shopping Street began when businesses started gathering around Takanobashi, a key transportation hub. Since 1919 (Taisho 8), it has continued to grow while remaining a beloved part of the community, cherished by locals for generations. The shopping street is home to a diverse range of businesses, including restaurants, daily goods stores, bookstores, and toy shops. The covered arcade provides a unique venue where tables and chairs can be set up to create an inviting event space. Here, guests can experience the authentic charm of a traditional Japanese shopping street while engaging with the local community through a lively and memorable party.





For a more dynamic experience, a ticket-based dining system can be implemented, allowing guests to explore various food stalls featuring oysters, Hiroshima beef, and other local specialties. Participants can also visit izakayas and okonomiyaki restaurants within the shopping street, creating a free-flowing, interactive dining event where conversations naturally flourish. Takanobashi Shopping Street is also known for hosting community-focused events, offering a wide range of cultural performances and activities such as Japanese taiko drumming, lion dances, traditional stage performances, and calligraphy demonstrations, making it an ideal setting for an engaging and immersive experience.

08 Yokogawa Shopping Arcade Area

A lively and modern collection of shopping arcades where creative minds gather

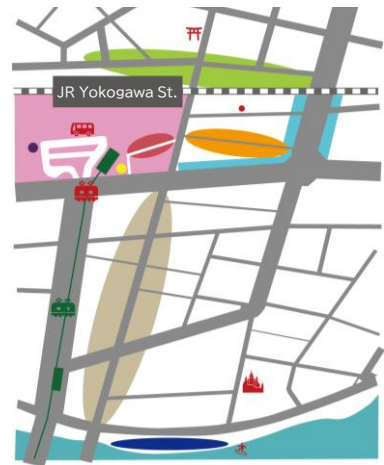
The Yokogawa area stretches approximately 400 meters north to south, centered around Yokogawa Station, just two stops west of Hiroshima Station. Historically known as the “Gateway to the Castle Town,” this district has flourished as a key transportation and commercial hub, connecting east and west, as well as north and south. Yokogawa is a vibrant community that actively embraces local culture and entertainment. The shopping street hosts unique events such as “Shōtengai Gekijō” (Shopping Street Theater), a collaboration with NPOs and artists, and “Yokogawa Zombie Night,” where the streets are overrun by zombies in a thrilling spectacle. This lively atmosphere provides an excellent backdrop for creative and engaging events, such as bar-hopping experiences utilizing multiple establishments or transforming the nearby riverside area into a party venue—even incorporating zombie-





In Hiroshima, known as the “City of Water,” the riverside area offers a stunning setting for hosting parties with a scenic waterfront view. With live performances, lighting effects, and catered food stalls, events here leave a lasting impression. Additionally, a free-flowing, ticket-based dining event can be arranged across Yokogawa Shopping Street, allowing participants to explore its many restaurants and bars. As a hub for community-driven events, the shopping street also offers live performances, workshops, and team-building activities. One of its most iconic attractions is an adapted version of “Yokogawa Zombie Night” , where zombies suddenly appear in the streets, creating an exciting and immersive experience for guests.

09 Daishoin Temple

True prayer with lights that have lasted for 1,200 years.

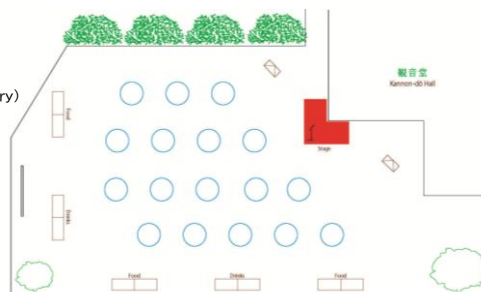
Founded in the first year of Daido (806 AD) by the revered Buddhist monk Kūkai, this temple is the oldest on Miyajima and serves as the head temple of the Omuro school of Shingon Buddhism. It is renowned for its stunning seasonal beauty, particularly during cherry blossom and autumn foliage seasons. Located about a 20-minute walk from Miyajima Ferry terminal, the temple is nestled in a tranquil setting with breathtaking views. The temple grounds can be used not only for outdoor receptions but also for meetings and training sessions inside its various historic buildings, providing a unique and immersive atmosphere for meaningful gatherings. As one of Hiroshima's most spiritually significant sites, the temple attracts many visitors who come to offer their prayers.





Guests can experience a special purification ceremony, featuring candles lit from the "Eternal Flame" and a man-made mist created using the sacred waters of Shiraito River that flows from Mount Misen. Within the temple grounds, there are numerous fascinating sites, including Henjokutsu Cave, where walking on the sand represents a pilgrimage to the 88 temples of Shikoku, and the 500 Rakan statues that line the long stone stairway leading to the main hall. Visitors can also take part in traditional Zen experiences such as zazen meditation, sutra and Buddha image copying, prayer bead making, and Goma fire rituals. Additionally, receptions can be held within the temple grounds, where not only traditional Buddhist cuisine (shojin ryori) but also other customized dining and musical performances can be arranged to create a memorable and culturally rich experience.

10 Miyajima Area




A hub of exchange and meetings for visitors and the people of Miyajima

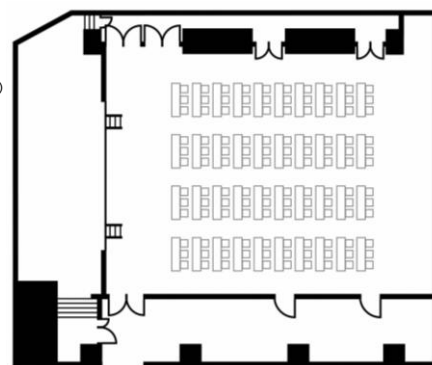
The facility serves as a hub for community lifelong learning and urban development activities, while also being located in the world-famous tourist destination, Miyajima. It acts as a place of interaction and connection for the local residents, workers, and visitors of Miyajima. On the first floor, there are meeting rooms and a Japanese-style room, which can be used for cultural experiences. On the second floor, there is a hall with seating for 300 people, complete with a stage, and from the windows, you can enjoy a view of the Toyokuni Shrine and the Five-story Pagoda. On the third floor, there is an observation room offering a panoramic view not only of the Toyokuni Shrine and the Five-story Pagoda but also of the Seto Inland Sea.





The hall, with its 300 seats and stage, can be used as a venue for seminars and conferences while enjoying views of the Toyokuni Shrine and the Five-story Pagoda. It is also a place where visitors can learn about and experience the history and culture of Miyajima, as well as a base for exploring the island.

Enjoy a stroll around this historical district known for its sake breweries

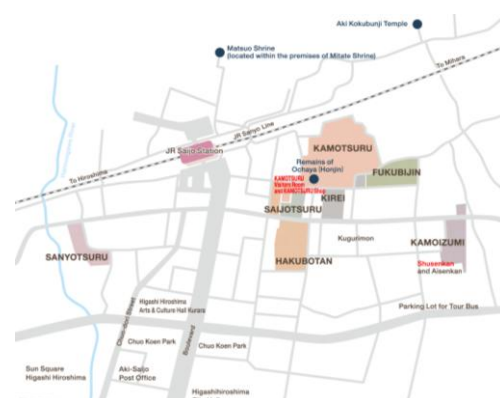

The seven sake breweries scattered along Sake Brewery Street each produce their own distinctive and captivating sake. You can stroll through the street, taste a variety of sakes, and perhaps discover your favorite one. After your walk, you can make use of the renovated old sake breweries and the squares behind them as venues for your party.

12 Yamato Museum




Where science, technology, and culture meet

Kure, once a thriving town known for its naval shipyard where the battleship Yamato was constructed, played a crucial role in Japan's rise as the world's leading shipbuilding nation. After World War II, the town continued to build some of the largest tankers in the world. At the Yamato Museum, you can explore exhibits that showcase the history of Kure and its legacy for the future.





At the Yamato Museum, you can host ceremonies around the museum's symbol, the 1/10 scale model of the battleship Yamato, or enjoy an outdoor party with a view of the Seto Inland Sea, watching the sunset and the port's nightscape while overlooking the shipyards and passing ships. Additionally, the entire museum can be rented for private tours or lectures, making it an excellent venue for communication events or excursions.

The site features a variety of facilities, including accommodations, a training center, a sports field, tennis courts, a clubhouse, a beach house, a swimming area, and an observatory. Visitors can enjoy stargazing at the observatory, as well as exiting outdoor activities like sea kayaking and stand-up-paddle-boarding (SUP).





The expansive grounds, offer a wide range of activities, including hot springs, accommodations, marine culture experiences, and sports. Guests can fully enjoy the flavors of the sea and mountains with delicious local cuisine. A beachfront barbecue creates the perfect setting for lively conversations, while gazing at the starry sky leaves a lasting impression on the heart. Nearby, visitors can take part in a unique moshio(seaweed salt) making experience, just as it was done in Japan's ancient Kofun period. The original salt, made by concentrating seawater with seaweed just as ancient people did, enhances the rich umami flavor of the seaweed.

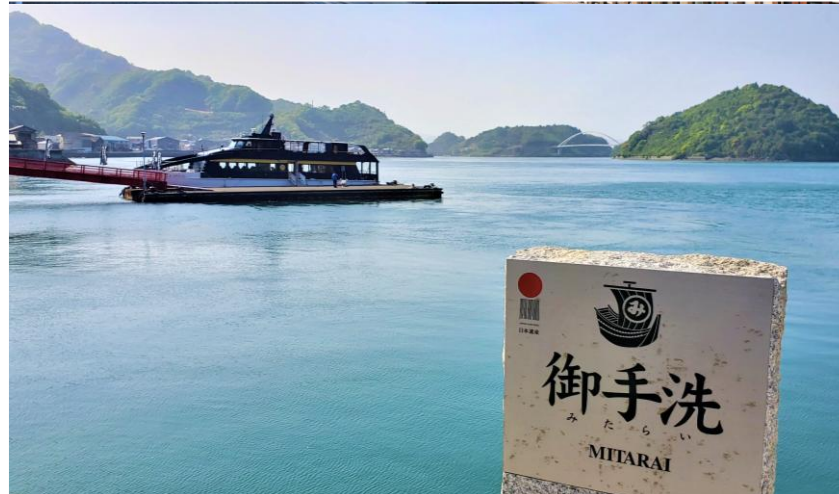


14 Mitarai Historic District

A charming portside town full of history

Mitarai, a port town that flourished during the Edo period as a stopover for the Kitamae ships, is rich in historical remnants, including merchant houses, tea shops, inns, shrines, and temples, many of which date back to the mid-Edo period and the late Edo period. The town exudes a unique atmosphere with these historical buildings and landmarks still intact. Since its establishment in the mid-17th century, Mitarai developed over about 200 years during the Edo period, serving as a key port for transportation across the Seto Inland Sea. It continued to evolve until the early Showa period, and its traces are still preserved within the village today. In 1994, it was designated as an Important Preservation District for Groups of Traditional Buildings by the Japanese government.





Local volunteer guides provide easy-to-understand explanations of Mitairai's history and culture. While strolling through the town, you can immerse yourself in the historical and cultural significance of this port town, which prospered as a key hub of maritime traffic. Mitairai is also recommended as a stop on a Seto Inland Sea sightseeing cruise, where the journey by boat enhances the sense of occasion. In addition, you can arrange for experiences such as enjoying the performance of traditional gagaku music, set against the backdrop of the Seto Inland Sea, or creating your own ikebana floral arrangements, which are displayed as a welcoming gesture at the eaves of houses.

An extraordinary dining experience in the middle of the mountains

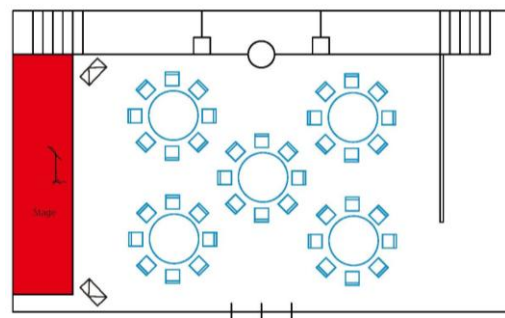

16 Nishiki River Area

Architectural beauty: the five striking arches of Iwakuni's most famous landmark

Kintaikyo Bridge is one of Japan's Three Famous Bridges, a stunning five-arch wooden bridge spanning the clear waters of the Nishiki River. Originally constructed in 1673 by Hiroyoshi Kikkawa, the lord of the Iwakuni domain, its gracefully curved structure is both intricate and innovative. Even by modern engineering standards, it is considered an architectural masterpiece. Surrounded by lush natural beauty, Kintaikyo Bridge is a beloved symbol of Iwakuni. Nearby, Iwakuni Castle was built atop Mount Shiroyama in 1608 by the first lord of the domain, Hiroie Kikkawa. Though it was dismantled just seven years later, the current castle keep was reconstructed in 1962. Inside, visitors can explore exhibits featuring scale models of Kintaikyo Bridge, historical photographs, samurai armor, and weaponry.





Kintaikyo Bridge lives up to its name, "Nishiki" (meaning "brocade"), with vibrant seasonal scenery—cherry blossoms in spring, traditional cormorant fishing and fireworks in summer, vivid autumn foliage, and a serene snow-covered landscape in winter. The castle keep serves as an observation deck, offering panoramic views of the Nishiki River, Kintaikyo Bridge, and even the islands of the Seto Inland Sea. One of Iwakuni's cherished summer traditions, cormorant fishing on the Nishiki River, boasts a history of over 400 years. Visitors can witness the mesmerizing skill of the master fishermen and their birds, illuminated by the flickering flames of traditional torches. Enjoy the ancient ayu fishing technique up close, set against the backdrop of Kintaikyo Bridge—a dramatic and timeless spectacle. Guests can also enjoy a meal onboard, featuring bento boxes prepared by long-established local restaurants. Additionally, a special welcome performance by the Iwakuni Domain Matchlock Gun Preservation Society can be arranged, offering a thrilling display of historic flintlock rifle demonstrations.

An elegant traditional Japanese garden with flowers and greenery for each season

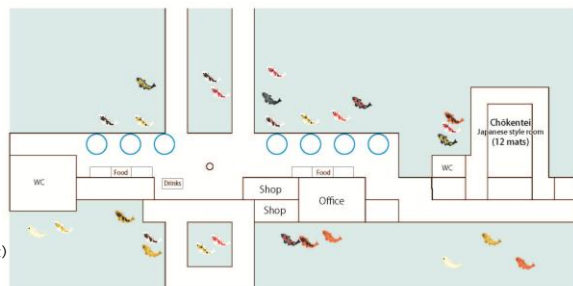

18 Buttsu-ji Temple

A sanctuary for quiet self-reflection

Founded in 1397, this temple was established by Kobayakawa Haruhira, who invited the renowned Zen master Guchu Shukyu, a monk who had trained in China during the Yuan Dynasty. Known as one of the most secluded Zen temples, it serves as a place for corporate and school training programs, attracting numerous visitors. The temple complex, surrounded by towering ancient cedar trees, is particularly breathtaking during the fresh greenery of spring and summer and the vibrant foliage of autumn, drawing many tourists.





Within the temple grounds, visitors will find cultural treasures such as the Buddha Hall, Jizo Hall, and a Hiroshima Prefecture-designated Natural Monument, the rare Rakanmaki (*Podocarpus macrophyllus*). A guided tour by the temple's head priest offers deeper insight into the historical background, making the visit more enriching than a simple stroll. Guests can also participate in a Zen meditation session at the meditation hall, providing an opportunity for quiet self-reflection. Additionally, visitors can enjoy *shojin ryori*, a traditional Buddhist vegetarian meal. Experience a truly unique and serene moment in this extraordinary setting.

Experience the magic of Hiroshima Kagura, a traditional performing art

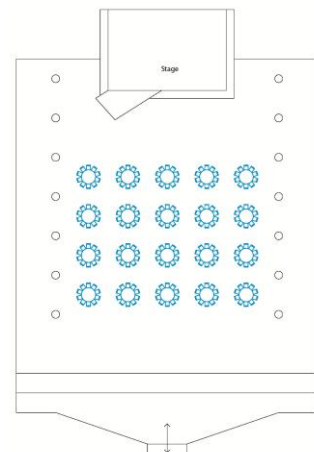

Nestled atop a small mountain in northern Hiroshima, this facility recreates an old-fashioned Japanese townscape where Kagura performances can be enjoyed year-round. The "Kagura Dome" and "Kamukura-za Theater" host over 150 performances annually by 22 Kagura teams, making it a truly unique venue where visitors can fully immerse themselves in the atmosphere of this traditional Japanese art form.





For a memorable event opening, organizers can make a grand entrance on stage dressed in traditional Kagura costumes. Guests can also experience wearing the dazzling costumes themselves, feeling their weight firsthand and gaining a deeper appreciation for the artistry of Kagura. At the Kagura Experience Hall "Waraku," both children and adults can participate in interactive activities such as painting their own Kagura masks or crafting miniature props. The facility also offers three traditional Japanese-style accommodations featuring wooden architecture and sunken kotatsu seating. 20 Okuda Gensō Sayume Art Museum

Museum offering the most beautiful view of the moon in all of Japan

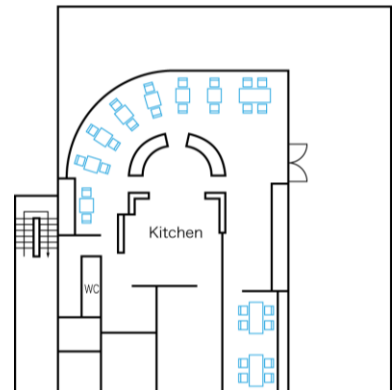
Gensō Okuda, a renowned Nihonga (Japanese-style painting) artist, and his wife, Sayume Okuda, a doll artist, were both born in Miyoshi City. This museum is unique in Japan, as it is dedicated to the works of this artistic couple. It serves as a cultural hub that fosters the harmony between two distinct artistic forms—Okuda’s two-dimensional Nihonga paintings and Sayume’s three-dimensional doll art—as well as the connection between Miyoshi’s natural beauty and artistic expression. For many years, the couple dreamed of creating a museum to house their works together. They carefully preserved their pieces to prevent them from being scattered, and their dream was ultimately realized when they donated their collection to their hometown, leading to the establishment of the Okuda Gensō–Sayume Art Museum.





The museum's lobby features a large east-facing glass window designed specifically for viewing the moonrise. This architectural feature recreates the scene from Gensō Okuda's masterpiece Taigetsu (Waiting for the Moon), capturing the moment when the moon appears between the trees. Inside the museum, visitors can enjoy the Taigetsu-an tea room, named after Okuda's famous painting, as well as Yōshoku Kōbo, a restaurant that offers dishes made with locally sourced ingredients. Both facilities are available for private bookings. Surrounding the museum, visitors can explore Toretta Miyoshi, a marketplace featuring local delicacies, and Hiroshima Miyoshi Winery, a full-scale winery producing high-quality wines.

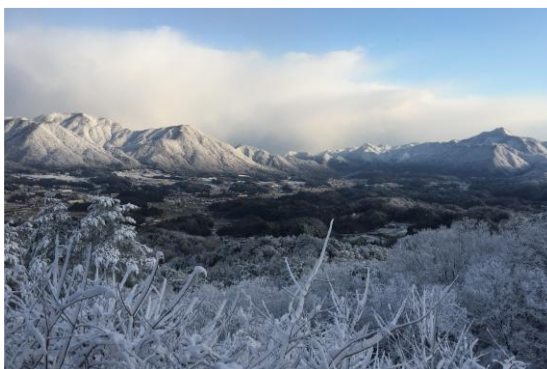




21 Ōnan Area




A scenic retreat surrounded by nature

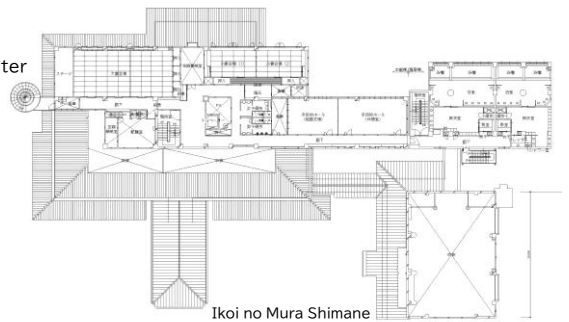

The clear streams flowing from the mountains of the Chūgoku region are home to the Japanese giant salamander, a nationally designated natural monument. The town is also known for its high-quality agricultural products, including rice, vegetables, and Wagyu beef. At “Ikoi-no-Mura Shimane”, a mountain top retreat, guests can enjoy breathtaking sea-of-clouds views and host conferences, parties, and overnight stays. Additionally, Mizuho Highland, one of the largest ski resorts in western Japan, attracts skiers and snowboarders from all over.





The rich natural beauty and stunning landscapes are among the highlights of Ōnan Town. When weather conditions are just right in spring and autumn, visitors can witness a breathtaking sea of clouds from various locations within the town. From the summit of Mizuho Highland, which stands at approximately 1,200 meters above sea level, panoramic views of the surrounding scenery can be enjoyed. Visitors can also experience trekking, explore the primeval beech forests on an off-road buggy, or host an outdoor barbecue party. In Ōnan Town, a variety of activities and experiences are available throughout all four seasons.

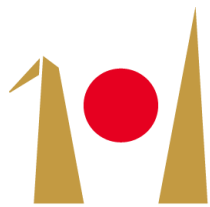
