

# Peace Memorial Park Area

## Peace Memorial Park

Under the project to make the whole neighborhood of the Nakajima district into a symbol of ever-lasting peace and a recreation area for citizens, this park was constructed as a commemorative facility based on the Hiroshima Peace Memorial City Construction Law promulgated in August 1949. Subsequently, the park was renovated into its current design in preparation of the 50th anniversary of the A-bombing. The park, including the A-bomb Dome area, occupies an area of 122,100 m<sup>2</sup>. In February 2007, the park became the first postwar park to be designated as a national scenic beauty spot. The Hiroshima Peace Memorial Ceremony is held in this park on August 6 every year.

### Atomic Bomb Dome

On August 6, 1945, the building was severely damaged and burnt by the first atomic bomb ever used in warfare. The Atomic Bomb Dome symbolizes the pledge to convey the horror of the atomic bombing and the call for the abolition of nuclear weapons and eternal world peace. In 1996, the dome was registered as a UNESCO World Heritage Site.



### Hiroshima National Peace Memorial Hall for the Atomic Bomb Victims

This hall collects the names and photos of the A-bomb victims and contains A-bomb memoirs to convey the experiences of the atomic bombing to future generations. Visitors have free access to the archives. Special exhibitions and recitations of the memoirs are also provided.
